Allocation Plan for Settlement Funds

Through a series of interagency and stakeholder discussions, the following priority areas have been identified and will serve as the framework of the City of Williston and Williams County Allocation Plan.

Awareness/Prevention

- Increase collaboration for awareness initiatives between public health and schools.
- Invest in paid media placements for opioid prevention and awareness campaigns.
- Conduct local pharmacy outreach to increase awareness of prescription monitoring programs.

<u>Training</u>

• Provide funding for access to training opportunities such as naloxone administration by first responders, proper cleaning protocols for hotels that have experience fentanyl exposure, general lacing education and awareness, etc.

Treatment/Services

- Provide gap funding to behavioral health providers for costs related to medication-assisted treatment, such as, but not limited to, medication and supply costs, and warm hand-off of services.
- Promote workforce development in the addiction counseling field and for peer support by working with local behavioral health service providers and building a relationship with the ND Training Academy for Addiction Professionals (NDTAAP) for placements in Williams County.
