WHAT IS LEGIONELLA?

• Legionella can make people sick when the germs grow in water and spread in droplets small enough

for people to breathe in.







HOW LEGIONELLA SPREADS

• Legionella is transmitted by breathing in of tiny water droplets containing the bacteria.

WHERE DOES LEGIONELLA LIKE TO GROW?

- Showers and faucets.
- Cooling towers, which are parts of large, centralized air conditioning systems.
- Hot tubs.
- Decorative fountains and water features.
- Medical devices (such as CPAP machines, hydrotherapy equipment, bronchoscopes,)
- Ice machines
- Humidifiers
- Hot water tanks and heaters
- Large, complex plumbing systems







PREVENTION FOR HEALTHCARE WORKERS

- •Keeping hot water temperatures high enough.
- •Making sure disinfectant levels are monitored per policy.
- •Keeping water flowing (preventing stagnation).







PREVENTION FOR FACILITIES

- The key to preventing Legionnaires' disease is maintenance of the water systems in which Legionella may grow.
- If Legionella is found in a healthcare facility's water system, the facility should work to eliminate the bacteria.
- Water management programs should be developed by facilities and properly managed.







Healthcare workers can help prevent legionella by identifying the hazards in the workplace.
